SUBJECT: FY 2023 REGIONAL BUDGETING GUIDELINES

Date : 8 February 2022

#### 1. PURPOSE

The Regional Development Council (RDC)-1 issues this memorandum to provide guidelines in the preparation, review and endorsement of the priority programs and projects of AROs, SUCs and GOCCs for inclusion in the FY 2023 Agency Budget Proposals pursuant to the Executive Order (EO) 325 <sup>1</sup> dated April 12, 1996, Memorandum Circular (MC) 54<sup>2</sup> dated February 2, 2004 and the National Budget Memorandum (NBM) 142<sup>3</sup> dated January 12, 2022.

This memorandum shall also ensure that agency priority programs and projects are consistent and supportive of the regional thrusts and priorities as contained in the **Enhanced Regional Development Plan (RDP) 2017-2022** and its Results Matrices, and the **Enhanced Regional Development Investment Program (RDIP) 2017-2022**. Considering that the successor RDP 2023-2028 is expected to be finalized by the first quarter of CY 2023, the RDC-1 will continue to adopt the thrusts and priorities of the Enhanced RDP which was approved in November 2020 and the Enhanced RDIP which was prepared in March 2021 to respond to the continuing and recent development initiatives in the country and in the region.

As emphasized in the NBM No. 142, the FY 2023 budget shall also take into account the continuing impact of the pandemic and the complementation of priority programs and projects with the Local Government Units (LGUs) and support in strengthening the LGU development capacities in light of the Supreme Court (SC) decision on the joint Mandanas-Garcia petitions.

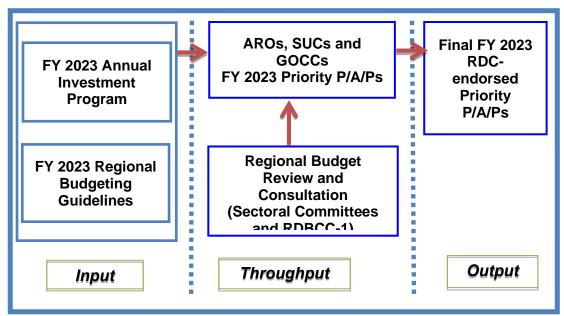

#### 2. REGIONAL BUDGETING FRAMEWORK

- 2.1 The regional budget preparation process shall incorporate the following policy directions:
  - 2.1.1 Consistency with the policies of the Duterte Administration as embodied in the 0-10 Point Socioeconomic Agenda and the Philippine Development Plan (PDP) and the priority programs and projects contained in the Public Investment Program (PIP) and Approved 2023-2025 Three-Year Rolling Infrastructure Program (TRIP);
  - 2.1.2 Supportive of the region's vision of becoming the agribusiness and tourism hub in Northern Philippines and operationalize the goals, strategies and priorities embodied in the **Enhanced RDP 2017-2022** and the priority programs and projects contained in the **Enhanced RDIP 2017-2022**;
  - 2.1.3 Implementation of EO No. 138, s. 2021<sup>4</sup> on the devolution of functions, services, and facilities to LGUs in phases with the complete hand over from the National Government (NG) to the LGUs not later than FY 2024 (NBM 142, section 2.3). Hence, agencies should refrain from duplicating the direct delivery of devolved functions and services with the LGUs, and rather focus on capacitating and monitoring the LGUs and shift to addressing emerging national and local program concerns consistent with the strategies outlined in their respective DBM-approved Devolution Transition Plans (DTPs) (NBM 142, Section 1.4);
  - 2.1.4 Provision of full support to the poorest, lagging and most climate vulnerable areas;
  - 2.1.5 Strengthen Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) through the Results-based Monitoring, Evaluation and Reporting (RbMER) Policy Framework; and
  - 2.1.6 Continued adoption of the budgetary strategies and procedures such as the Cash Budgeting System (CBS); Two-Tier Budgeting Approach (2TBA); Unified Accounts Code Structure (UACS); Program-based budgeting structure through the Program Expenditure Classification (PREXC) Approach; and disaggregation of lump-sum amounts within the agency specific budgets.
- 2.2 In the preparation of FY 2023 budget proposals, all participating AROs, SUCs, and GOCCs are enjoined to take into consideration the following:
  - 2.2.1 FY 2023 Annual Investment Program (AIP); and
  - 2.2.2 FY 2023 Regional Budgeting Guidelines.

2.3 The RDC-1 shall undertake the Regional Budget Review and Consultation through the Regional Development Budget Coordination Committee-1 (RDBCC-1) in collaboration with the Sectoral Committees of the RDC-1 to be participated in by key AROs, SUCs and GOCCs as enumerated in item 5.4 of this Memorandum. Participating AROs, SUCs, and GOCCs shall consider the recommendations of the RDC in their FY 2023 Budget Proposals for endorsement to their Agency Central Offices (ACOs) and Commission on Higher Education (CHED) Central Office (CO) for the SUCs.

#### 3. REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT THRUSTS, PRIORITIES AND STRATEGIES

3.1 Anchored on the national government's 0-10 Point Socioeconomic Agenda and the PDP, all AROs, SUCs and GOCCs shall ensure that the priority programs and projects in their budget proposals directly support the following sector outcomes as embodied in the various chapters of the Enhanced RDP 2017-2022:

#### 3.1.1 Social Sector

- Nutrition and health outcomes for all improved (Chapter 10)
- Income-earning ability increased and adaptability enhanced (Chapter 10)
- Flexible and continuous learning opportunities for all improved (Chapter 10)
- Universal and transformative social protection for all achieved (Chapter 11)
- Safe, resilient and sustainable communities built (Chapter 12)
- Demographic transition accelerated (Chapter 13)
- Gains from demographic dividend maximized (Chapter 13)
- Safe, orderly, and regular migration ensured (Chapter 21)

- 3.2 All AROs, SUCs and GOCCs shall also ensure the inclusion of priority programs and projects responsive to the:
  - 3.2.1 Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) 2030;
  - 3.2.2 Regional Recovery Program (RRP) from COVID-19
  - 3.2.3 Balik Probinsya, Bagong Pag-asa (BP2) Program

- 3.2.4 Regional Task Force to End Local Communist Armed Conflict (RTF-ELCAC) Implementation Plan;
- 3.2.5 Magnificent Magic 7 (MM7) Convergence Program
- 3.2.6 Lower Amburayan Development Corridor (LADC) Strategic Plan;
- 3.2.7 Regional Disaster Risk Reduction and Management (RDRRM) Program
- 3.2.8 EO No. 352<sup>5</sup> dated July 2, 1996 on the System of Designated Statistics;
- 3.2.9 Harmonized Region 1 Research and Development Agenda, CY 2017-2022; and
- 3.2.10 Gender and Development Agenda pursuant to and in accordance with Republic Act (R.A.) No. 9710 or the Magna Carta of Women.
- 3.3 All concerned AROs with devolved services under Section 17 of R.A. No. 7160 or the Local Government Code of 1991 and other applicable laws, shall support the roll-out of the SC decision on the Mandanas-Garcia petition. Specifically, concerned AROs shall observe the following:
  - 3.3.1 Include the funding requirement for capacity building programs for LGUs to enable them to assume the devolved functions and services (NBM 142, Section 2.4.1);
  - 3.3.2 Prioritize subsidies for local projects of LGUs belonging to the 5th and 6th income classes, the Geographically Isolated and Depressed Areas (GIDA) as well as those with the highest poverty incidences, ranked in top third highest (NBM 142, Section 2.4.2); and
  - 3.3.3 Be consistent with the DBM-approved DTPs or the DTP duly endorsed by its Devolution Transition Committee if the plan has not yet been approved by the DBM (NBM 142, Section 2.4.3).
- 3.4 All AROs, SUCs, and GOCCs are enjoined to consider the District Representatives' Proposals in their FY2023 Budget Proposals.

#### 4. RDC-ACO DIALOGUE

To pursue the priority development projects of Region I, the RDC-1 shall ensure participation to the RDC-ACO Consultation/Dialogue being facilitated by the NEDA Central Office. The activity will be attended by all RDCs and selected ACOs.

- 6.5 If necessary, the NEDA-1 shall extend technical assistance to the AROs, SUCs and GOCCs in accomplishing the RDC Forms.

#### 7. AROS/SUCS/GOCCS BUDGET PROPOSAL ENDORSEMENT BY RDC-1

All AROs, SUCs and GOCCs shall submit their final FY 2023 Budget Proposal utilizing the required RDC budget forms, duly signed by the Regional Director or Head of Agency, to the RDBCC-1 Secretariat for endorsement to their respective ACOs and the CHED (for SUCs).

#### 8. POST BUDGET PREPARATION ACTIVITIES

The AROs, SUCs and GOCCs shall follow up from their respective ACOs and the CHED for SUCs actions taken on the RDC-endorsed budget proposals upon submission to the DBM CO and shall accordingly provide feedback to the RDC-1.

#### Seven (7) Years Geomean of Fecal Coliform (MPN/100<sub>mL)</sub>









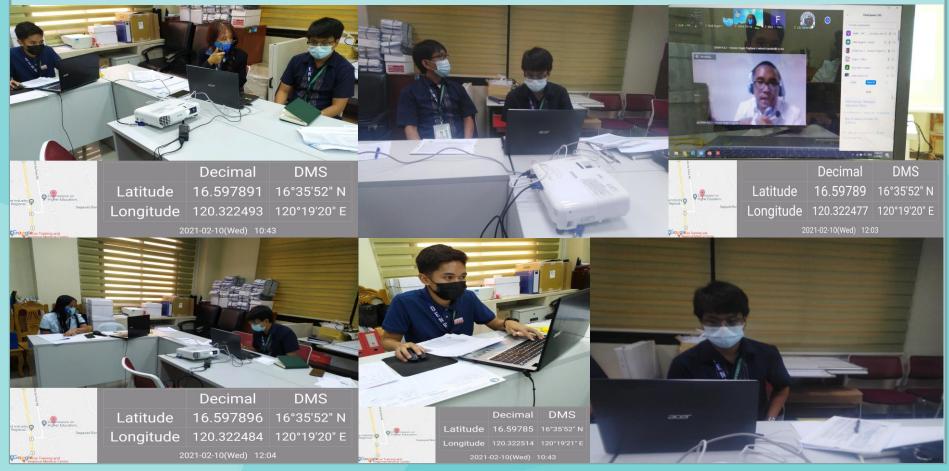

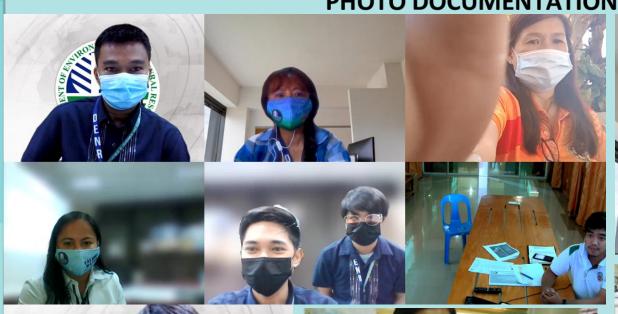
